

WELCOME TO TODAY'S WORSHIP

You are warmly welcomed to St. John's Church, particularly if you are new to our congregation or are a visitor. St. John's is a member Church of the Risborough Team Ministry, serving the parish of Lacey Green, Loosely Row and Speen. The Sunday 10:00 am service in church and the 11:00 am service on Zoom will be led by Canon Tony.

Worship in Church - Covid-19 Measures

Government guidance over group meetings currently remains the same. There are no changes to regular worship in churches because places of worship are considered to be "Covid-secure venues" so they are exempt from the 6 people limit for services of public worship and private prayer. However, groups inside church should not be more than 6 persons, groups should not combine and there must be social distancing between groups. So, in other words we continue to follow existing procedures.

So, the limited services at St. John's will continue, with the Said Communion services being held on Tuesdays at 9:30 am and on Sundays at 10:00 am (BST) only for those wishing to attend. The regular Sunday on-line service on Zoom will continue be held at 11:00 am (BST). Unfortunately, 8:00 am Services on Sundays continue to remain suspended.

Holy Communion will continue to be in one kind only and the 2-metre social distancing requirement will apply. Contact details of those attending will need to be recorded in a suitable notebook and details kept for 3 weeks. When attending worship in church <u>you must continue to wear a face mask within the church building</u> apart from the celebrant, those reading lessons / leading intercessions and during receipt of Holy Communion.

FOCUS ON... ST. LUKE THE EVANGELIST

St. Luke is both the author of the Gospel which bears his name and the Book of the Acts of the Apostles. He was a travelling companion of Saint Paul who describes him as the "beloved physician". He is the patron saint of doctors and of artists. Of the four Canonical Gospels, it is the Gospel of Luke which most embodies what is sometimes called a "social gospel", that is to say the task of serving the needs of the poorest and most deprived people in our world, whether it be within our own society or in those areas which are part of what is often referred to as the "developing world". So it is in St. Luke's Gospel that we find the Magnificat, the joyful song of the Blessed Virgin Mary, which affirms that the coming of the Messiah will bring down the powerful from their thrones and raise up the lowly, filling the hungry with good things and sending the rich empty away.

Two very popular Parables of Jesus appear only in St. Luke's Gospel, the Parable of the Good Samaritan and the Parable of the Prodigal Son; through which St. Luke affirms to his readers that God is compassionate and merciful, and that no-one is ever beyond the reach of divine redemption and salvation.

Woven through the fabric of St. Luke's Gospel, in fact, is an overriding image of Jesus as the champion of the poor and the weak, of women, and of others who held a lowly place in the society of First Century Palestine, of the sick and the needy, of prostitutes and tax-collectors, of sinners seeking salvation, the powerless and the vulnerable, all those on the margins of polite society. And all these St. Luke presents to his readers as a cavalcade of witnesses who, in Jesus, have found that God will never ever reject them or desert them. The core message which St. Luke affirms is that the Good News of divine salvation is for each of us who know only too well our need of God, as it is for everyone who seeks God and whom, in his boundless and self-sacrificial love, he will never turn away.
