THE ST. JOHN'S LENTEN FRONTAL

In last Sunday's Pew Sheet, I asked how many of the 5 groups of symbols relating to Jesus' journey to the Cross shown on the Lenten Array Altar Frontal could you name?

Starting top left there is a lantern. This probably relates to events after the Last Supper, when Jesus and the disciples (except Judas Iscariot) are spending the night at Gethsemane where Jesus is praying. The disciples have fallen asleep and Judas arrives with a crowd of people from the Chief Priests, probably by lantern light, to arrest Jesus. We will hear this story again on Palm Sunday (Mark Ch. 14 VV. 32 – 50).

FOCUS ON... THE JERUSALEM TEMPLE

The First Temple in Jerusalem was built by King Solomon and said to have been completed in the year 957 BCE. According to the Book of Deuteronomy, Solomon's Temple replaced the Tabernacle, or "Tent of Meeting", which was a portable earthly shrine first erected in the Sinai wilderness under the leadership of Moses. Solomon's Temple was raided by the Egyptians, and later by the Assyrians. And it was totally destroyed following invasion by the Neo-Babylonian Empire in 586 BCE under King Nebuchadnezzar. A series of deportations of those from the upper echelons of Jewish Society then took place in what is known as the Babylonian Exile. In the year 539 BCE, the Neo-Babylonian Empire was defeated by the Persians and the exiled Judaeans were allowed to return home under the governorship of Prince Zerubbabel. Permission was given for the building of a Second Temple on the Jerusalem site: the construction of which is dated to the period 521-516 BCE. Accounts do suggest that Zerubbabel's Temple was a much more modest building than Solomon's Temple. Later the whole region fell to Alexander the Great but after his death in 323 BCE, his vast Empire was divided, and Judaea fell under the iurisdiction of the Seleucids. Antiochus IV "Epiphanes", a Seleucid ruler, embarked on a programme of enforced Hellenisation in which Jewish religious observances were banned and an image of Zeus placed in the Temple. The Jewish Festival of Chanukah therefore celebrates the restoration of the Temple in 166 BCE after the Maccabean uprising. Around 20 BCE, the Temple was renovated and greatly expanded by Herod the Great, who was a puppet ruler during the Roman occupation of Judaea. Herod's Temple was the building that Jesus would have known at the time of his earthly ministry. It was destroyed by the Romans in the year 70 CE: an event which the Gospels of Matthew, Mark, and Luke all say had been foretold by Jesus.

WORSHIP AT ST. JOHN'S

England remains in a third National Lockdown. Current guidance is where churches decide to do so and it has been judged safe, collective worship is still permitted, although the latest guidance from the Bishop strongly encourages churches to suspend collective worship in church and switch to on-line services. However, the PCC has decided that inchurch collective worship will be suspended for the present. This decision has been made to protect our congregation due to high infection rates in Buckinghamshire including with the new more transmissible strain of Covid-19. (The other churches in the Risborough Team are also suspending in-church services for the present.) It is currently expected that this arrangement will continue until further notice.

We will continue to hold an On-line Morning Worship Service with Hymns on Sundays (at 10:00 am GMT for the present). The Tuesday morning service has been replaced with an On-line Celtic Morning Prayer service at 09:30 am GMT. We will also be opening the church for private prayer on two days during the week (Tuesday Morning from 10:00 to 10:30 am and Thursday Evening from 7:00 to 7:30 pm).
