WORSHIP AT ST. JOHN'S

FOCUS ON SAINT TERESA OF AVILA

ast Friday, 15th October, was the feast-day of Saint Teresa who was born in 1515 in Avila in Spain: her parents being of a noble family and devoted Christians. Together with Saint Catherine of Sienna, she was one of the first two women ever to be officially declared Doctors of the Church. Her Mother died in 1529, and at the age of 20 she overcame opposition from her Father to become a nun at the Convent of the Incarnation in her native Avila. It has been said that she became a nun with determination but not enthusiasm: and that she could not bear the thought of leaving her family. At first, she suffered several bouts of ill-health: but she persevered, and, in time, she began to make deep progress in contemplation. As the years passed, she received a number of mystical experiences including what has been described as a remarkable mystical piercing of her heart by a spear of divine love. In middle-age, she resolved to found a convent under the original and strict form of the Carmelite rule. After a number of setbacks, St. Joseph's at Avila was opened in 1562, the first house of reformed or "discalced" (barefooted) Carmelites. During the next 20 years, she travelled around Spain, founding some 17 convents, often in conditions of significant hardship. The reforms she introduced spread to the men of the Order, outstanding among their leaders being Saint John of the Cross. It has been said that Saint Teresa of Avila represents a classical example of someone who combined the life of religious contemplation with commonsense efficiency and activity in practical matters. The most important of her extensive writings are said to be her Life of herself written up to 1562 and at the request of her confessors: the Way of Perfection written to instruct her nuns: the Book of Foundations: and The Interior Castle. Hers was a strange and troubled life in many ways but it has had a tremendous influence, both in her own time and ever since
