### **WORSHIP AT ST. JOHN'S**

Recent UK Government Guidance has been reviewed and at this stage few changes are going to be required for in-church worship at St. John's. These will remain in place for the immediate future:

- Wearing masks in church, apart from for the choir when singing and for those leading worship is now mandatory. Also, during actual receipt of Holy Communion. The congregation are requested to wear masks in Church, maintain social distancing and sanitise their hands.
- Singing of hymns in Church during the sung services will continue. The congregation can continue to join in the singing of hymns, but to do so wearing their masks.
- Holy Communion will continue in one kind only for the time being and will be administered from the area in front of the chancel step.
- The Peace will continue for the time being to be observed discreetly and following social distancing protocols.
- The congregation are asked to observe social distancing as far as possible and the Lady Chapel area will be set aside as a <u>mandatory</u> social distancing area for those who feel they need to socially distance themselves from others. Please respect this.

#### FOCUS ON..... THE WEDDING AT CANA

The event of the Wedding at Cana marks the first of a series of signs in Saint John's Gospel through which the divinity of Jesus becomes increasingly evident. The mother of Jesus is there at the Wedding Feast as a guest, as are Jesus and his disciples. When Mary tells Jesus that the wine has run out, his response is not very encouraging. He tells her, in effect, that it is none of their business, adding, "My hour has not vet come." When Jesus does then speak to the servants, he tells them to fill six large empty iars with water. This does not seem to suggest anything wonderful, extraordinary, or miraculous is to be expected. But what then happens to the water is truly utterly astonishing. The wine in the jars is not just more wine, it is much better wine than before. And the shortfall has not simply been made up, there is an outrageously generous amount - six iars, each holding twenty to thirty gallons. Everything in the build-up has suggested failure and disappointment and lack of promise. And so, as Saint John the Evangelist tells the story. it is presented as a real surprise when such a very extravagant sign of divine generosity takes place. There are times in our spiritual lives when we do feel that we can offer God our whole heart, the fullness of our praise, and the best of our life. But most of us do go through periods in our lives when things seem plain and ordinary. And when what we are offering God seems meagre and grudging and unpromising. We are not prayerful enough, not loving enough, or good enough - or so we may think! We may well ask ourselves, what can God do with our life - such as it is? But we do have to say that we simply do not know just what might be possible. And, in fact, we cannot know until we take the leap of faith and open our hearts to God, and say yes to God, and trust! And thus invite the miracle to take place. If Jesus can take a few gallons of water and turn it into colossal amounts of the very finest wine, then God can surely take whatever small stuff we have to offer and make it truly wonderful for the kingdom.
