
FOCUS ON...REMEMBRANCE SUNDAY

The Church has different Liturgical Colours for the seasons of the Liturgical Calendar. Violet, the colour of sadness and mourning, for the penitential seasons of Advent and Lent. White, the colour of peace and of purity, for the festivals of Christmas and Easter. and for many of the saints' days. Green, the colour of growing things, for what the Church calls "Ordinary Time". Red, the colour of Fire and of Blood, is the colour of Good Friday. of the martyred saints, of Pentecost, and of what is called the Kingdom Season. Red is the colour of Remembrance. Indeed, red is the colour of the wine which the Church brings to the altar as an offering in its primary act of remembrance, the Fucharist, in which we remember Christ's saving death and resurrection, as we re-present his sacrificial offering of love in the present day, and as we look to the future hope of the coming of the Kingdom in its fullness. How appropriate, then, that the red poppy came to symbolise the fields of Flanders on which so many lost their lives in the First World War: and continues to be such an important symbol of Remembrance. The red poppy reminds us our debt of gratitude to those of the Armed Forces and their families. It reminds us of the responsibility of support and care for ex-service personnel who have been seriously injured in the course of armed conflict or whose lives have been otherwise scarred as a result of their experiences. It reminds us of our duty to pray for those on active service. for all casualties of warfare, and for lasting peace and reconciliation. It reminds us of the need for us to commit ourselves to work together for peace and justice in our world. Above all, the red poppy reminds us of our high calling of solemn remembrance of the sacred memory of those who made the ultimate sacrifice in the course of the two World Wars, and in the many subsequent conflicts that have cast a dark shadow across the lives of so many people and continues to do so in our own time.
