### **FOCUS ON... CHRIST THE KING**

The Festival of Christ the King effectively brings the Liturgical year to an end - to a fitting climax - as we look to Advent Sunday next week and the beginning of a new year for the Liturgy of the Church. We move from Year C to Year A. The image of Christ the King is a concept at the heart of the Christian tradition, and finds expression in so many of our hymns, and in countless stained-glass windows, and in the rich history and tradition of Christian art. The classic image of Christ the King celebrates the death, the resurrection, and the ascension of Jesus. Death gives way to life, goodness triumphs over evil, light overcomes darkness, sorrow gives way to iov. In classical New Testament theology, the complete and final revelation of the Kingship of Christ will be at the Last Day, when he returns "and all the angels with him... [to] sit on his throne of glory". As followers and servants of Christ, we are all of us called to share in the glory and the Kingship of Christ. The First Epistle of Peter calls us "a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's own people". That is a high calling to live up to. And the Gospels tell us that we fulfill our calling - and are judged in our calling – by our willingness to serve Christ in the hungry, the thirsty. the stranger, the naked, the sick and those in prison. But that is really only part of the whole picture. Because Jesus not only calls us to help those who are in need. which many people do irrespective of whether or not they are Christian believers, he also gives this commitment to the service of others a much wider dimension. He says, in fact, that his Kingship is to be seen in those in need, made manifest in those who most need our care and support, those, who we are called to serve for the sake of Christ our Lord and King. And so it is that, we are told, that in caring for them, which is a very worthy end in itself, we are also giving glory to him; Jesus Christ, the Suffering Servant, the chosen Messiah, the Lord of Lords, the King of Glory.
