FOCUS ON... ASH WEDNESDAY

Ash Wednesday is a holy day of praver and fasting. It is preceded by Shrove Tuesday and marks the first day of the penitential season of Lent. In the Western Church, it is observed by Roman Catholics, Anglicans, Lutherans, Methodists, and Moravians, as well as by many from the Reformed tradition. Ash Wednesday derives its name from placing ashes on the foreheads or on the hands of worshippers with either the words "Repent: and believe in the Gospel" or "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return: turn away from sin and be faithful to Christ". The ashes are customarily prepared by burning palm leaves blessed at the previous vear's Palm Sunday celebrations. Ashes are a very ancient sign of penitence - in the Old Testament. Job repents "in dust and ashes." and there are other associations of ashes and repentance in Esther, 1st and 2nd Samuel, Isaiah, and Jeremiah. By the 10th century, the monk Aelfric tied the practice, which dates to the eighth century. to the period before Easter, writing, "Now let us do this little at the beginning of our Lent that we strew ashes upon our heads to signify that we ought to repent of our sins during the Lenten fast". The method of calculation of the forty days of Lent has varied considerably in Christian history. It is now usual practice in the West to count these days continuously to the end of Holy Week (not including Sundays); with Lent beginning on the sixth Wednesday before Easter. The Fourth Sunday of Lent (known as Laetare or Refreshment Sunday) was allowed as a day of relief from the rigours of Lent, and the Feast of the Annunciation to the Blessed Virgin Mary almost always falls in Lent. These brief breaks from the austerity of the Lenten season are the background to Mothering Sunday which is marked by the distribution of flowers and cake. As on Ash Wednesday the forty days of this penitential season begin. may our Lord grant us grace to keep Lent faithfully.
