FOCUS ON... MOTHERING SUNDAY

The observance of Mothering Sunday originally referred to the Church, and indirectly to God as "mother" of us all. By long tradition, Mothering Sunday has also long been a day to reflect on the role of Mary the mother of Jesus in the divine plan for human salvation. In times past, on Mothering Sunday and by way of a Lenten observance, Christians were required to worship at their "mother" Church, which is to say the place of their Baptism. This custom was especially significant at a time when it was commonplace for children to be sent away to work, perhaps in service, or as maidservants, or as farm labourers. For Mothering Sunday, these children were allowed home to spend the day with their families. We are told that, on their journey home, they would pick wild Spring flowers to present to their mothers. So here we have the origins of the long-standing Church custom of children presenting flowers to their mothers, as well indeed to others in thanksgiving for the caring role that they play in our lives. It was in 1913 that Constance Adelaide Smith, the daughter of an Anglican clergyman, set about reviving and reinvigorating the observance of Mothering Sunday in this country. Her intention in seeking to restore the place of Mothering Sunday in the life of the Church and in our nation was, as she put it, to honour "Mother Church, mothers of earthly homes, Mary the mother of Jesus, and Mother Nature". This means we can say that Constance effectively introduced a fourth intention to the keeping of Mothering Sunday by her reference to "Mother Nature", an element which has resonances with our contemporary and growing concern for ecological matters and the care of the environment. On Mothering Sunday, then, we commit ourselves once again to our part in making the love of God known in the world. In so doing we fulfil the Law of Christ: Love the Lord your God with heart and soul and mind and strength; Love your neighbour as yourself.
