
FOCUS ON... THE GREEN SEASON

Liturgically speaking, we are in the "Green" season in the Church, green being the colour of the vestments worn at this time of the year in which the focus is on our faith taking root and continuing to grow in strength and vitality. This is because we say that green is the colour of living, growing things. Hence the use of green vestments and green altar coverings in Church for what we call the Ferial season or "Ordinary Time". Christianity is a faith which seeks to take the world seriously and, from Genesis Chapter 1, we discern that being made in the image of God means that human beings have a responsibility and duty for the stewardship of creation. Christianity is an incarnational religion based on the insight that the material is shot through with the divine: and that holiness is to be found in ordinary everyday things. This is, at least in part, why so many of the didactic stories that Jesus told that were couched in agricultural metaphor - the Parable of the Sower: the Parable of the Vineyard; the Parable of the Fig Tree; the Parable of the Wheat and the Tares; the Parable of the Mustard Seed. Because, for those with whom Jesus first shared these stories, they addressed very powerfully their common experience of daily life. And, most probably, brought to mind their own efforts to grow what we might call basic necessities from just a few small seeds. And so, they will readily have made the wider connection that good things can flourish and grow from the tiniest and simplest of beginnings. It was the 15th Century Christian mystic, whom we know as Julian of Norwich, who gazed in puzzlement upon what was a tiny thing - seemingly akin to a hazel nut - and the answer came to her that "It lasts and ever shall be because God loves it". And she discerned that all things have their being through the love of God. "In this little thing", she wrote, "I saw three truths. The first is that God made it. The second is that God loves it. The third is that God looks after it".
