#### **FOCUS ON ... THE SHEPHERDS**

In his Gospel narrative. Saint Luke emphasises to his readers Jesus as the Son of Man, fully entering into our humanity. For Luke, Jesus is good news for all. but especially for the outsiders in society. In his story of the Nativity, Luke does not mention the Magi, but rather he tells of how the angel appeared to shepherds and how these humble people then travelled what was presumably a relatively short journey to Bethlehem in order to see Mary and Joseph, and the child lying in the manger. A crucial element to Saint Luke's account is that the shepherds are the outsiders, literally and metaphorically. But crucially, it is to these outsiders that the angel proclaims the good news of the birth of Jesus. If Saint Luke were present in person today, he would no doubt tell us that this is good news for each person born into humble circumstances, or who finds themselves on the edge of society. And so it is that the angels choose to sing the good news to outsiders. But, in Luke's account, the shepherds are not just to kneel in front of the baby Jesus – these illiterate shunned people are the ones who have been chosen to pass on the extraordinary message that this baby is our Saviour, the Messiah, the Lord. This is turning the values of the world upside down. What does this say to us, then, if we do not regard ourselves as outsiders? As individuals, each of us is a mixture. There are parts of ourselves we like, and parts of ourselves we dislike and would like to change. Just as the angel of the Lord did not appear to those who were most admired or considered worthy in first-century Palestine, but to the shepherds, the good news that the angels bring is primarily for those parts of ourselves we feel bad about. As we come, like the shepherds, to kneel in front of the child in the manger, we are able to bring all of ourselves, the bits we find likeable and the bits we find much harder to like, in order in order to receive the joy of the message given to the shepherds, the good news that God is with us.
