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Vicar's Remarks

When I wrote my remarks for the Annual Report in April 2021, it was then the presumption that the government's national lockdown would be ending in late June of last year, and I think it was widely assumed at that time that the Covid 19 pandemic crisis would then be over and that no further lockdowns would be needed. In the event, that proved not to be the case with a further surge of infections over the winter period resulting in a further period of restrictions. And, as I write these remarks, the Covid infection rate, both nationally and locally as well as internationally, remains high though the number of people becoming seriously ill with Covid appears to be a much smaller percentage of the total number of people infected than was the case in previous waves of infection. For many Churches, and of course for very many other institutions, the length and severity of the Covid 19 pandemic has had a seriously adverse and detrimental effect on activities and economic outcomes. So far as Saint John's Church is concerned, it is apparent that there are a small number of people who were attending our Services before the first Covid 19 lockdown who have not, at least as yet, returned to attending in-person worship with us. In particular, it does seem that it has been our work with children and young families that has been hardest hit. Having said that, it has been encouraging to welcome a number of new people to our Services who have quickly become part of our Church family since the resumption of in-person worship. Our provision of online worship during lockdown appears to have been appreciated and, at the present time, we are continuing with a monthly online Evensong Service whilst we continue to assess what the right balance between in-person and online worship is going to need to be into the future.

As I write, we are all too aware of the ongoing terrible conflict in Ukraine, and the distressing and tragic consequences for people's lives. We have registered Saint John's Church as a "Welcoming Church" for refugees from the war and it is known that there are some 30 or more local families who are opening up their homes to refugees from Ukraine, several of whom have already arrived with their hosts. We are also aware of the consequences for many people, both here and elsewhere in the world, of rising inflation and energy costs, no doubt partly driven by consequences of the Covid 19 pandemic and by the wider effects of the war in Ukraine. It is to be hoped that the opportunities for prayer and pastoral support which the Church provides can be a valuable avenue of support for people facing very difficult times.

At the time of the 2021 Annual Report, we were still in the process of raising funds for the restoration and repair of our Samuel Green pipe organ. And so we were very pleased when the project was able to get underway by way of the removal of the instrument at the end of last October in order for the restoration and repair work to begin. In fact, this happened in two stages. First the organ pipes were removed and taken to an organ pipework specialist and then, a few days later, the rest of the organ was removed to the organ builder's workshop in Surrey. And earlier this year came the very pleasing announcement that the government's VAT grant scheme for Listed Places of Worship had been extended for a further three years from 1st April of this year which will be a significant saving to the total cost of the works being carried out. At the time of writing these remarks, we are eagerly awaiting an update from the organ builder concerning progress so far with the work being undertaken. It remains our intention to have a celebration event when the works are fully completed and the organ is back in situ.

Friday assemblies at St. John's School and Speen First School continue to be a valuable opportunity to reach a large number of children on behalf of the Church. Those currently on the rota for this ministry are myself, the Reverend Peter Godden from St. Dunstan's, and Padre Andi Chapman from RAF High Wycombe who replaced Padre Chrissie Lacey as RAF Chaplain in

January of this year. With Schools having now fully returned to normal working patterns, both of our Parish Schools have been able to resume holding services in St. John's Church including End of Term and Harvest; and, in the case of St. John's School, Start of Term services; Harvest; Armistice Day; Christingle and other Carol services; as well as services for Candlemas, Ash Wednesday, and other special occasions in the Church calendar. We were also pleased to have St. John's School this year represented at out Mothering Sunday service. As is known, St. John's School has been a member of the Oxford Diocesan Bucks Schools Trust since this multi-academy trust was founded by the Diocese of Oxford; with Speen First School having been accepted for membership and approved by the Secretary of State to join later in the current calendar year.

So far as my own extra-curricular activities are concerned, I am currently Vice-Chair of Churches Together in Risborough, as well as Vice-President Elect of the Princes Risborough Rotary Club. I continue to be a Bishop's Reviewer for the Diocese of Oxford, having undertaken four clergy Ministerial Reviews in 2021 on behalf of the Bishop. I continue to chair the Churches Together in Britain and Ireland Student Hardship Fund, and I am still currently on the rota for the occasional Saga Cruise as ship's chaplain.

I am glad to have this opportunity to thank our Churchwardens Pat and Margaret for their continuing friendship and support. Likewise, I do also wish to thank our PCC Treasurer Caroline, our PCC Secretary Mark, and all the key officers of the Church and all members of the PCC, for their hard work and commitment. I am also very grateful to our Licensed Lay Minister Graham for his ongoing help and commitment; and also to my clergy team colleagues in the Risborough Team Ministry, as well as the retired clergy who actively support us at St. John's, notably the Reverends Peter Viney, Nick Molony, and Rose Williams. I also thank our organist Cher, as well as Gavin, and their family, for all they bring to the high standards of the quality of our Church music and worship. And I do thank all members of our St. John's congregation for the commitment and hard work that has enabled our Church life to be sustained and, in many ways, even to flourish despite all the challenges and difficulties of the recent past.

St. John's Church Choir

The Choir had been unable to sing in church since March 2020, due to Covid Lockdowns. Throughout this time, Cher and Gavin with assistance from Tom and Inês (when available) provided music for ZOOM Services. For special services, other members of the choir were recorded singing.

On 5th July 2021 we had our first Choir Practice, socially distanced in the body of the church. We were allowed to sing for services in the Choir Stalls, and one of the first services was the funeral of Stella Boll on 15th July. The choir then took their usual summer break and returned to something like normal in September. Since then, we have been able to sing at all services where we were needed.

We were sad to lose Mike Eden, due to other commitments, but were fortunate to be joined by Gavin Mole and Hugh Thomas Davis. Ian Ward and his son Patrick also returned to help out and have been helping to provide a music group for All Age Worship. We hope to be able to build on this and look forward to welcoming more children and young people in church, now that they have a service specially for them.

Catherine Tillotson allowed the church to use her lovely garden in Lane Farm for a garden party to raise money for the Organ Fund on Saturday 18th September. We are grateful to her and her family, and also to the choir members who worked so hard to provide music and refreshments. Catherine's son Alexander has been playing the organ for some services, and this has been a great help to Cher. We are so lucky to have a talented young man to stand in when needed.

On Remembrance Day the choir sang the Rutter Pie Jesu, with a solo by Carla Galvin, who left to work in Canada the next day. She and Lucy have just returned, and we hope to be welcoming them back to the choir soon. Alexander Tillotson played the trumpet solo for The Last Post. Cher is keen to start a Junior Choir, and Carla will help with this. Some of Cher's piano pupils have already sung at the 9 Lessons and Carols, The Crib Service and Mothering Sunday Services.

Advent and Christmas were the usual busy time for the choir, with the Lessons and Carols, Crib Service, Midnight and Christmas morning services. The choir also decorated a tree for the Christmas Tree Festival, with the theme of Angels from the Realms of Glory. We all helped to make the angels and achieved second place.

A very special occasion was the marriage of Marina Deacon and Rob Eldridge just before Christmas at which Mike sang the solo. Lent went by in a whirl of activity, with several of us contracting Covid in spite of being fully vaccinated. On Mothering Sunday, we provided cupcakes. It was special joy to have the Junior Choir leading the singing and joined by three very young children. It was also a pleasure for the choir to be able to sing All in the April Evening again at the Palm Sunday Service. Fortunately, we had a good turnout for Easter, and were able to sing around the Cross of Daffodils as usual.

The organ was dismantled and taken away for a complete rebuild in November, and we eagerly await its return. We plan a special concert to mark this event. The Queen's Platinum Jubilee will be happening soon, and several choir members will be singing some of the Coronation music with massed choirs from the RSCM at a special service on 14th May at St John the Baptist in Windsor.

On the evening of Sat. 4th. June, Gavin and his friend Gary Bland will be putting on a cabaret 'Jazz From The Musicals' just prior to its first performance in London. Tickets can be obtained from Tony.

As always, our grateful thanks go to Cher for all she does. She has risen to every challenge in the last couple of years. What would we do without her!

Server's Report

During 2021 I have continued to support the clergy at St. John's during the main Sunday services, although more of the things the Server traditionally does have been re-introduced. For much of the year Communion has been received "in one kind" so my duties as Sanitiser in Chief" have continued.

As a side-line, I have over the past couple of years been looking to try and save St. John's a few pennies in terms of consumables costs notably candles. At St. John's we still use traditional wax candles on the Altars, in the Sanctuary and Chancel and for the Paschal Candle, whereas other churches, such as St. Dunstan's use nylon oil. There are pros and cons for each. Using wax candles does mean you get short lengths / stubs left over which are not fit for further use and we had built up a sizable collection of these. At Christmas and other times, we use votive lights in red plastic cases and a couple of glass cased lights elsewhere during the year including for the hanging Sanctuary lamp. I have now been melting the candle stubs down to cast replacement candle inserts for these votive lights so I am hopeful we should not need to buy any more plastic votive lights / votive light inserts for a good while. Now before anyone asks, no I am not able to mould candles for the altar so we will still need to buy 1 inch diameter candles, but as Tesco's would say "every little helps". My acquired skills have allowed me to set up a side-line of home-produced candles including candles in teacups for sale at e.g., the Advent Coffee Morning in November, at which I did a modest trade for church funds.

I remain as Chair of the local (St. Osyth) Chapter of the Guild of Servants of the Sanctuary for 2019. Like many organisations the Servers' Guild not been operating in the normal way due to Covid restrictions. The Chapter met for the first time since January 2020 by holding a Guild Offices at St. Mary's Aylesbury during June with a second service being held at St. John's in

September at which Canon Tony gave the Address. Unfortunately for various reasons, we have not met again since then.

There is still an opening for a reserve / second server to provide cover for when I am away or on a more regular basis, so if there are any willing volunteers who would be willing to be trained up, then please contact Canon Tony or myself.

Treasurer's Report (Including Fundraising)

General Fund

For the year ended 31st December 2021 the accounts showed a deficit of £1,837, with the pandemic having a continued impact. The suspension of services between January and the end of April 2021 meant that we did not benefit from collections from those who do not give by way of stewardship and visitors at popular services such as Mothering Sunday and Easter. The Omicron wave at the end of the year also meant that the usually popular Christmas services were poorly attended as were our fundraising events.

Similar to last year, over 80% of our income was derived from stewardship giving, church collections, and the related gift aid with the other main contributors being one off donations, fees received for weddings and funerals and fundraising. A breakdown of income, including an analysis of our fundraising income, is included in Appendices 1 and 2.

As is the case every year, a large portion of our income (72%) was used in paying our parish share. The Parish Share is the amount of money that each parish is asked to contribute to support the mission and ministry of the Church in the Diocese of Oxford and is spent on housing and stipend for our clergy, training and other ministerial support such as church schools, safeguarding and work with young people. The calculation of the parish share for each church is based on income, numbers on the electoral role and clergy cost. The payment of the parish share is

mandatory and so maximising our receipts and keeping all other costs in check is critical. We are fortunate that we have a number of dedicated volunteers whose help with cleaning, lawn mowing, hedge trimming and general maintenance means that we can save on these expenses. We remain extremely grateful.

Charitable donations this year were limited to amounts collected for Christian Aid and The Children's Society, together with our regular donation to Churches Together in Risborough. As is customary, Bibles were presented to the year 6 pupils leaving St John's school in July 2021. In addition to the amounts shown in the accounts, we also made donations of non-perishable harvest produce to Risborough Food Cupboard; and donated a large number of toys to the Salvation Army for distribution at Christmas.

Reserves in the general fund amounted to £8,560 at 31st December 2021.

Restoration Fund and Organ Fund

On a more upbeat note, having agreed to proceed with the refurbishment of the Samuel Green organ, we have been delighted to raise sufficient funds to cover the budgeted cost of this. This was made possible due to many generous donations and grants together with gift aid thereon, and an extremely enjoyable and successful fundraising concert in the summer, for which we are most grateful to the choir and our hosts at Lane Farm. The balance on the organ fund was £27,765 at 31 December 2021. There is also a balance of £15,551 in respect of the restoration fund.

Outlook For 2022

Although the majority of COVID-19 restrictions have now been eased it is clear that it is going to take us some time to recover from the pandemic. I urge you all to pray about your giving and consider joining the Parish Giving Scheme.

For anyone interested, the full annual accounts compiled to satisfy the requirements of the Charities Act and subject to Independent Examination, are displayed on the church notice board and will be available on the church website after this meeting.
